Quartzsite. Arizona Showcase & Swapmeet January 1 - February 28, 2024

The Quartzsite, Arizona shows are famous among professional and amateur lapidaries and jewelry artists. The small desert town lies about 18 miles east of the Arizona-California border, and about 250 miles northwest of Tucson. A quiet town of about 3,000 year-round residents, that population explodes during the January-February show, making Quartzsite a vibrant outdoor desert shopping mall. About 3,000 vendors from all over come to Quartzsite to sell virtually anything and everything, including serious dealers (about 500) of rocks, minerals, gems, fossils and jewelry. Of the ten or more shows happening simultaneously there are four that are strictly rock and mineral related: Desert Gardens Show, QIA Pow Wow, Prospector's Panorama, and Tyson Wells Show. Prices are notoriously cheap compared to Tucson, where costs for many of the same items tend to be quite higher. All shows have free admission and parking — though very difficult to find — and no registration is required.

SNGMS Board Meeting Minutes for 1/4/2024

On January 4th 2024, the regular Board of Directors meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at Desert Art Supplies at 4 PM by the President. All Board members except Parliamentarian were present. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was recited.

The minutes of the November 30th 2023 meeting were approved as read.

Treasurers Report: Balance of checking account is \$23,986 and is staying stable. The investments balance is \$124,241. The club purchased two new CDs, a 6 month and a 12 month. They were purchased near interest rate peak. Our lapidary shop lease expires on 3/31/24 and we will need to negotiate a renewal.

Shop Report: All equipment is up and running. Cabinets have been hung on the wall and bookshelves for the library will be constructed beneath them. The rock shelves will be restocked and the back storage room cleaned out. Plan is to tile the office later this year.

New Business:

Del Walkenshaw presented proposal to purchase banners and lighting for club use at upcoming shows. The Board approved presenting proposal at General Meeting.

Debbie Bucknam discussed plans for scholarships to provide two graduating high school seniors \$500 each in order for them to pursue a college education in one of the following fields of study: geology, paleontology or mining. Del Walkenshaw proposed, seconded by Orville Wiemers, and approved by the Board, that "the scholarship plan be presented at the General Meeting for approval."

Jonathan Tredwell has volunteered to head the Field Trip Committee.

More classes are needed. Members who wish to share their knowledge by teaching are encouraged to reach out to any board member with their proposal. Any ideas for community outreach are also encouraged and David Ford has volunteered to consolidate any information he is given.

The meeting was adjourned at 5 PM.



SNGMS General Meeting Minutes for 1/8/2024

On January 8, 2023, the regular meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at 6 PM by the President. The Secretary was present. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was recited. The minutes of the November 6th 2023 meeting were approved as read.

Treasurers Report: The checking balance as of end of December was \$23,986. The brokerage account balance was \$124, 241. Our finances are in good shape, membership is growing, the Shop comes close to breaking even and our shows are making money.

Membership: There are 732 adult and 151 child members. Membership Chair, Claudia Crouse, explained the SNGMS policy for membership renewal. A normal renewal must be received before January 1. Between January 1-31, you can renew and for an additional \$5 retain your original join date. After January 31 a renewal will reset your original join date to the renewal date.

Committees: Chair positions filled include: Kerry "Chops" Wenzl – Shop Manager, Barbara Belcher – Hospitality, Jonathan Tredwell – Field Trips. A form will be posted on the SNGMS web site for members to make field trip suggestions. Harrison Brooks from Desert Art Supplies has volunteered to provide media help.

Shop Report: "Chops" Wenzl reported that the equipment is up and running. Some reorganization is happening.

Club Event Equipment: Debbie Bucknam proposed, seconded by Bruce Martin, and passed by the membership, that "up to \$1,000 be allocated to purchase four sets of lights and table flags for use at club events." "Chops" Wenzel proposed, seconded by Ken Bucknam, and passed by the membership, that "up to \$1,000 be allocated to purchase four sets of lights and table flags for use at club events."

SNGMS will also participate in a school science fair on April 4, 2024 for approximately 500 kids. 

Caliche - the unassuming rock that packs a punch. This sneaky underground surprise is a natural cement of calcium carbonate that binds gravel, sand, clay and silt. It's found world-wide in arid regions. As many Las Vegan gardeners know, it forms a compact and stubborn mass that can be almost impossible to dig up (or through). It inhibits water drainage and halts plant growth. Caliches can store carbon, making them important to the overall global carbon cycle.

Caliche is usually light-colored, but can range from white to light pink to reddish-brown. Caliche can be fluorescent. The major process of forming caliche begins when calcium carbonate is leached from soil near the earth's surface by water percolating down. The

calcium carbonate then precipitates below the surface to form caliche layers.

At first the calcium carbonate precipitates as small grains or thin coatings on sediment grains or soil particles. As the grain coatings thicken, nearby grains will be cemented together, and nodules made of multiple grains form. As the cementing process continues, a large subsurface layer may form. Layers can be over three feet thick and extend for miles.

Caliche is used in construction worldwide when higher grade materials are not available. It has been used in Portland cement. The Great House at Casa Grande Ruins National Monument in Arizona was built with walls of caliche. Caliche was also used in the mortars for Mayan buildings in the Yucatán Peninsula of Mexico.

With its hardened exterior and uncompromising nature, caliche is a desert legend that refuses to be ignored or underestimated!



Lapidary/Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks Working with Jewelry Resin

Resin is a liquid plastic commonly used in mixed media jewelry projects. It can be poured into molds, used to fill bezels, and much more. Resin is poured wet and then "cured" to make clear hard shapes or surfaces. The main types used for jewelry are two-part epoxy resin and UV resin (sometimes also called 1-part resin). Two-part resin consists of two different solutions, which are mixed in equal parts and allowed to dry to a clear solid over 2-3 days. UV resin is applied in thinner layers and

remains wet until being exposed to UV light, either from bright sunlight or a UV lamp. This article will focus on two-part resin because epoxy resin is more scratch and heat resistant than UV resin. Two-part resin also resists yellowing.

Resin can be used to embed items in metal bezels, and to cast shapes in molds. For bezels, you want to use a resin that produces a domed finish. A domed finish self-levels create a raised but gently curved surface, magnifying everything in the bezel and giving it extra sparkle and shine. Because doming resins mix thick (like honey), they are meant to be poured to a depth of eighth-inch or less to allow bubbles to escape before the resin starts to cure.

If you are working with molds, you need a casting resin. Casting resins mix thinner than doming resins, allowing bubbles to escape easily. You can pour them into deep molds, allowing you to get crystal-clear bubble-free resin shapes. Because casting resins mix thin, they will produce a flat surface.

It takes some practice to get the best results with resin. Be patient! Resin is versatile and can allow a lot of creativity. Here are some tips for working with two-part resin:

1. Use jewelry resin, it doesn't cure as fast as urethane resin so you have more time to pour the jewelry resin.

2. Work on a silicone mat because it wipes clean with a baby wipe. Use packing tape to remove any small, dried, stuck pieces of resin from the mat.

- 3. Don't make too much resin to avoid waste. Mark your measuring cups with a marker.
- 4. Make sure bezels and molds are dry before using them.
- 5. Less is more when adding colorant, mica, and other materials to the resin.
- 6. Mix the resin SLOWLY to minimize bubbles.
- 7. Work on a level surface so the resin fills the bezel or mold evenly.
- 8. Wear clean disposable nitrile gloves at all times when working with resin. Work in a WELL VENTILATED area.
- 9. After the mold is filled with resin, smack it on a flat surface a couple of times to get rid of bubbles.
- 10. Let the resin dry for 24-48 hours. If it's not dry by then, you didn't mix the resin correctly, the portions were wrong.

Mineral Musings

Three Kids Mine, Henderson, Nevada

The Three Kids Mine is an open pit mine and mill site that produced manganese for the U.S. government between 1917 and 1961. Manganese was needed during WWI and WWI to strengthen steel. The mine is about five miles northeast of downtown Henderson, Nevada and about four miles south of Lake Las Vegas. The Three Kids Mine includes open pits, waste rock, and ore yard, mill site, and tailings ponds.

With the end of WWI, the demand for manganese dropped, mining activities slowed, and the Three Kids Mine was nearly dormant for several years.

In 1942, a mill was constructed for on-site processing of manganese ore to help meet the WWII demand for manganese. The site became the largest open pit mine for manganese in America. There are three pits. The biggest pit is 300 feet deep.

At the end of WWII there was once again a decline in activity at the Three Kids Mine, and the mill closed in 1944. Site activities remained limited up until 1951, when the mill was remodeled and reopened. The mine and mill continued producing manganese until all the open pits were exhausted. In 1961, use of the mine and the mill was permanently discontinued. Lead and manganese had been stockpiled on the site and these materials were sold after 1961. In the early 1980s, a few parcels from the property were sold and redeveloped. Scenes for the science fiction movie "Cherry 2000" starring Melanie Griffith and David Andrews were shot at the mine in 1987.

Environmental assessments of the mine were done from the late 1990s to the early 2000s. Dust, mining residues, an processing wastes containing lead, arsenic, manganese, and diesel fuel were identified as concerns.

In 2012, an artist known as Aware_Indecline painted a "Wheel of Fortune" type wheel on an old thickener pit*. The pits were used to leach pulp in the production of manganese.

In 2014, the federal government enacted the Three Kids Mine Remediation and Reclamation Act. The legislation is a framework for transferring land at the mine from the federal government to the City of Henderson, Nevada. The land will then be transferred to a private developer. Currently, efforts to finish the transfer are underway.

The plan is to clean up the site and turn it into a master planned development named "Lakemoor Canyons". There is too much contaminated soil and waste at the site to remove. The proposed cleanup plan is to put the tailings, waste rock, and contaminated soil into the open pits, and then to cover the backfilled pits and other disturbed areas with 10 feet of clean soil. Cleanup activities will be done concurrently with new home construction.

The current cost estimate for the cleanup is about \$250 million. So far, cleanup money has come from private investors. Some money from land sales will be used for parts of the cleanup. The rest of the money will come from property taxes within the Lakemoor Canyon Development Area over a 45 year period.

* Ore was crushed to free grains of manganese from the matrix of the ore. The crushed ore was then mixed with water and chemicals (pulped) in seven acid-resistant structures called "thickener pits." The largest pit was 250 feet in diameter. The chemicals made the manganese float away from other materials in the water so it could be concentrated. This process is called "thickening."
