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## President's Message

from Sue Moore

Greetings Fellow Rock Hounds:

As I am writing this message, I am staring at the ice which formed on my pool deck last night. I am ready for some of that fabulous Las Vegas winter weather, where it gets up to 70 degrees during the day. Having said that, Bill and I did enjoy those warm temperatures, during our January stay in Quartzsite.

We made a plan to take the RV down to Quartzsite and stay the entire week of the Powwow and attend all of the field trips that we could, which were put on by the Quartzsite Roadrunner Gem and Mineral Club.

We arrived on Saturday, January 15th and camped with Lynn Manthey, Bill Kogan, and Craig and Sheila Tremmel at the usual spot off Plomosa Road (Bouse Road), 6 miles north of Quartzsite. First thing Sunday morning, we headed for town, ready to go through Desert Gardens to look for the elusive perfect rock buy. That was when we remembered that it was indeed Sunday morning, and the vendors don't like to open before 11:00am. We ended up walking the entire Desert Gardens area, buying along the way, and returned to camp. On Monday, Sheila and I hit the two warehouse sales areas in Tyson Wells, where we made some great buys for our wire wrapping hobby.

Then we followed the Arizona Gem Trails book to a jasper field near the town of Brenda and collected a bucket of assorted jasper.

Bill and I stopped at the Quartzsite Roadrunner Gem and Mineral Club to join up and confirm the field trip schedule for the week. The club normally holds a field trip every Tuesday, but during the Powwow, they add two additional field trips, per day, from Wednesday through Sunday. We were ready to go.

Tuesday's field trip was for Pastelite west of Palo Verde, CA, south of Blythe. The distance from the Quartzsite meeting place to the collection site was 48 miles, 4x4 not required. When we arrived at the site, some of the old hands immediately climbed the pinnacle and started to hammer and chisel away. I went up the pinnacle and simply picked up the larger pieces left behind from other rock hounds. This rock was basically pale pink with darker pink and blues laced through it. The density was high and it didn't look like it had a lot of fractures. We collected around three five-gallon buckets full and checked out and returned to camp. I asked Bill Kogan to review our finds to make sure we picked up the good rocks. We passed inspection.

Wednesday, we chose the Desert Rose field trip, which was east of Quartzsite 33 miles. I had never gone for Desert Roses so I was all excited until I found out that they meant Chalcedony Roses. I have 2 large buckets of Chalcedony Roses in the back yard already, but I figured it would be a fun outing, so we went anyway. Bill and I collected around 5 pounds of Chalcedony Roses and checked out to return to town to do some more shopping and returned to camp.

## Board Meeting Summary - February 3, 2011

Meeting called to order and pledge of allegiance given.

Minutes of the last board meeting were read and approved.

Treasurer's report: was given by Pat Skeary. The cost of the newsletter was discussed, and the bills for the kids club, and for the silversmith class were discussed and approved.

**Old Business:** The travel expense report was discussed. The travel expense report must have an odometer report to show date and actual miles. The IRS will allow 51 cents/mile for personal travel this year, however the amount changes each year.

Sue Moore stated that recurring bills would be paid automatically; any other bills must be approved by the board prior to payment.

The complete confirmation of appointments was held for the executive session after the open meeting.

The application for business license for charitable organizations is still ongoing and is nearly complete. Only one more document is required to complete the process.

Sue Moore reports we are going to get 16 lockers for storage and security.

### **New Business:**

2011 Trips: Bill Lemon is moving and will not be able to help with trips this month; in fact he may need help with his move to the new residence.

Last year travel expenses were high and with the increasing cost of gas this would be higher this year. A suggestion was made to distribute the cost to several members. The suggestion was to start with close in trips.

February: Glenn Beye has two locations, one to Rosie's Den area on 12 Feb. and the other to Taylor Mountain 26 Feb. March: Trips to Oatman for fire agate would require a fee. Suggestions for a weekday trip were discussed; also a return to Buffington Pockets was discussed. April: The trip to Burro Creek, AZ will be April 6-10. May: Gold Point on Memorial Day weekend. June: Bill Kogan in Lund will guide to a lake south of Ely June 10-13. The remainder of the year's trips are open for suggestions.

Clare Breneman will be doing the show and sell on Monday the 7th of Feb.

Frank and Chuck will be checking on the requirements for placement of our signs in the meeting.

Sandy Cunningham stated we are late to sign up for the Sons of Erin; the costs were \$400 for a booth and \$100 deposit and insurance. These prices were thought to be high. Also discussed was a possible garage sale by the club, the Bead Renaissance show. It was noted that the California Federation website keeps a list of all shows.

Sue Moore noted that our library needs new material, donations will help. She also noted a used book store called Michael's Used books on the corner of Tropicana and Pecos. The address is 3430 E. Tropicana.

Mary Beth Paladino will make a presentation at Brown Middle School. The kid's club Valentine's Day party will be held in the shop 11 Feb. 2011.

Jan Fitzgerald said she would do publicity and asked what approvals would be needed. The answer was any costs would require board approval.

Chuck stated his phone number 702-6896-4186 if any questions came up about the shop. A question was made about the cost of a phone in the shop; we will seek a reasonable rate for a non-commercial telephone.

Open session closed at 7:45 and Executive meeting at 8: PM. The names were assigned to the jobs and the list was generated. Speakers for our meetings were discussed and suggestions are welcome.

Bill Kogan's brother Joe drove down to meet up with him and set up his camp with our hearty group.

Thursday's trip was for Green Banded Rhyolite and was just up the Bouse Road to Quinn Pass. The total mileage from the meeting place to the site was 13 miles. We parked and started up the arroyo to the vein. I went wild when I saw the quality of the rock and ended making 3 trips back to the jeep with rock and actually took my turn with hammer and chisel on the side of the hill to release new rock. I donated some of these slabs to the raffle table. Bill and Joe Kogan went with us back to the Rhyolite for some more samples, which was fun since it was so close to camp. On the way back to camp we picked up some red jasper, which we found 2 years ago, also just east of camp.

Friday, we took the longest trip, 58 miles, which was north and west past Parker, into California for Purple Jasper. This was harder work. We parked and hiked around a mile up the dry wash and then went up the hill with hammer and chisel. This yielded a nice jasper that not only had purple, but red and blue colors as well. Once Bill and I staggered back to the Jeep with our bounty, we checked out and returned to camp. Once again, Bill Kogan inspected the lot and gave his blessing.

Saturday, we went for Jasper and Hematite. Sheila Tremmel and I had tried to find this on our own, using the Arizona Gem Trails book, but we couldn't find the correct turn off from the Bouse Road, into the desert. Once again, we met the Roadrunners at the fire house meeting place and took off. The total distance to the site was 21 miles. I don't know what I was imagining, but this rock was stripes of red jasper and black hematite. I had purchased some samples in town that I really liked so I was delighted to be at the source. Bill and I collected 2 5-gallon buckets full and checked out to return to camp. However, we started talking to the old hands who knew the area and we asked about the Sunday trip to get "bacon rock". I haven't been rock hounding forever, but I had heard several description of "bacon rock" and wanted to know what it was. They gave us directions to the site, which was on the way back to camp, so off we went to find it on our own. Somehow, we fumbled around and met up with 2 other guys who were in their custom Samurai and together, we all found the bacon rock. It turned out to be an extremely heavy onyx which was clear, golden and red colored in a yellow and brown base rock. Then we hammered and chiseled to our hearts content until I was sure glad that we had the Jeep lifted because we came back to camp loaded up.

We were the last of the Mohicans at our camp by then as everyone else had gone home, so we decided to return to Las Vegas on Sunday, having met our goal of 6 club trips. What a great way to spend a week in Quartzsite! I recommend this to anyone who enjoys field trips, as the area is so diverse in the types of rock available.

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




## Change to Polished Slab Mailing



**From a 1880 Geology Book ...** information provided by Doris Currington

At that time (1880), it was stated that Nevada was only fit for mining as the land was scarcely fit for agriculture or pasturage. Its silver mines are its sole worth and are producing 45% of all the silver wealth in the United States at \$12,000,000 yearly. The only towns are mining towns. Nevada has the richest salt mine, in Clark County, Lake Shore Rd.

The Nevada census: 1860 - 6,857, 1870 - 58,711, 1880 - 62,266. Teachers in public schools - 56, Students - 1,856, non-public school teachers - 28, and students - 517.

## Nevada Geology *by Doris Currington*

Nevada geology is rare among other states, except Hawaii as it has a non-history being volcanic except for sand. Nevada was above water thousands of years when the rest of the world was underwater, and making fossils. It had the oldest exposed land.

Pre-Cambrian - meaning hidden life. Areas in Clark County now are Johnnie Mine, Gold Butte, and Virgin Mountains.

Cambrian - includes areas with limestone shale, quartz, dolomite, and is found in multiple areas in Clark County.

Ordovician - Spring Mountains and Arrow Canyon Range.

Silurian - North Spring Mountains and West Dry Lake.

Devonian - Virgin Mountains and Muddy Peak

Mississippian and Pennsylvanian - Monte Cristo, Bird Springs, Roger Springs, Callville, Roger Springs area has the largest salt deposits.

Permian - Kaibab, Toroweep, and Coconino Red Beds.

Triassic - Moenkopi and Coconino.

Jurassic - Sandstone.

Cretaceous - Horse Springs, Muddy Creek, Overton Fanglomerate.

Tertiary - Las Vegas Formation, Las Vegas Range, S.E. Las Vegas Valley, and Henderson. The Tertiary period begins our period and our pre-history of less recent and recent life.

## Aquamarine Facts & Fancy

**Facts:** The semi-precious aquamarine is a gemstone-quality blue beryl, with a hardness of 7.5-8. It is a fairly common and affordable gemstone. It is very similar to light blue topaz in both color and properties. The most valuable color is a deep blue aqua. Most aquamarines on the market are heat treated to intensify their color.

Sources of aquamarine include the United States (California, Colorado, North Carolina, and New England), although most valuable aquamarine comes from Brazil. The name of aquamarine is derived from Latin words meaning water and sea.

As well as the March birthstone, aquamarine is the stone for the 19th anniversary.

**Fancy:** Aquamarine has been thought to bring foresight, courage, and happiness to the wearer, and to increase intelligence and youthfulness. As a healing stone it is said to decrease anxiety. Legend says it is the gem of the mermaid with the power to keep sailors safe and protect them from seasickness.
