




## **Location of the SNGMS Lapidary Shop**

# Lapidary and Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks

#### **Rock Tumbling**

The simplest and cheapest lapidary art form is rock tumbling. Tumbled rocks are smoothed, rounded, and polished by moving the rocks through grit suspended in water. You need a tumbler and abrasives, and the rough stones you want to polish. To use a

tumbler, place the rocks, water, and the abrasive grit in the tumbler drum, following the directions for your tumbler model. Tumble first with coarse grit, then medium, and fine. There are two types of tumblers: rotary and vibratory. Vibratory tumblers shake the rocks and grit. Vibratory tumblers work faster than rotary tumblers, but their drums wear out quickly. Rotary tumblers roll the rocks and grit over each other, and they are the most common type of tumbler for hobbyists.

Rotary tumblers have one or two drums, usually made of rubber to reduce noise during tumbling. A rubber gasket keeps the lid from leaking, and the drum sits on rollers that are rotated by a motor. If you just want to polish a few stones, you might not need a tumbler large enough to do them all at once. With a smaller tumbler, you may have to process your stones in batches.

### **Stone Sizes**

If you put only large rocks in the tumbler, there will be few contact points between the rocks, and little grinding will occur. With a range of rock sizes, the small rocks fill the spaces between large rocks, creating more points of contact between the rocks. Grinding occurs when grit gets caught between the rocks, so the more points of contact, the more effective the grinding. The largest stone you can tumble is about half the diameter of the drum. A tumbler with a drum 4 inches in diameter can polish 2 inch diameter stones. Put stones with a variety of sizes in the tumbler. The sizes should range from not more than half the diameter of your drum to about 1/10th the size of the largest stone. If all the sizes you need aren't available, use a hammer to create them. Alternatively, you can buy ceramic media filler.

#### **Stone Hardness**

All the stones in the drum need to have the same hardness. Harder stones will scratch softer ones. Stones used just for filler can be softer that the stones you want to polish, since it doesn't matter if the filler is scratched. Not all stones will take a polish, just the harder ones. Try scratching them with a pocketknife. If you cannot scratch the rock, it will take a polish.

#### **Avoid Contamination**

Different size grit is used for each step of the tumbling process. If grit sizes get mixed up, it can cause problems. For example if coarse grit gets into the medium grit, it will scratch the rocks and you might need to do the medium grit step over again with new grit. Avoid this type of contamination by rinsing the rocks and the tumbler drum when you change grit sizes. Contamination from rocks that are brittle or have a granular texture can also happen. These rocks might break or shed grains in the tumbler. The grains and broken pieces can cause unwanted scratches. To detect rocks that will shed grains in the tumbler, rub two of your rough rocks together while applying a bit of pressure. If particles are coming off the rocks, then don't tumble them with quality rough stones.

### Location, Location

Tumblers are noisy and can run for days. Rubber drums help reduce noise. Placing the tumbler on the <u>FLOOR</u> (not a shelf) in a closet helps. Sometimes placing the tumbler on a towel or a piece of carpet helps. Be considerate in your placement if you live in an apartment. Enclosures are not recommended because tumbler motors are air-cooled. If they overheat, the life of the motor is shortened.

# **Emerald, the May Birthstone**

The word "emerald" comes from the Greek word *smaragdus*, meaning "green gem." Emerald is a variety of beryl, a mineral that grows with six sides and up to a foot in length. Emerald color can range from light green to a deep, rich green. Dark green emeralds are the most valuable. The rarest emeralds have an intense green-blue color.

Emeralds are found all over the world, including Colombia, Brazil, Afghanistan, and Zambia.
Colombia has produced the finest emeralds for more than 500 years.
Emeralds are often treated to improve color or clarity. Common treatment methods include dyeing and fracture filling.

Emeralds need special care. Avoid exposure to heat and chemicals. Never put an emerald in an ultrasonic cleaner because the vibrations and heat can cause fillers to sweat out of fractures. Filled emeralds can also be damaged by exposure to hot water used for washing dishes. The safest way to clean emeralds is to gently scrub them with a soft brush and warm, soapy water.



# **Mineral Musings**

#### **Trilobite Trivia**



Trilobite bodies had three lobes: two pleural lobes and one axial lobe. The axial lobe covered the mouth, stomach and gut. The pleural lobes covered the legs and gills.

Trilobite means "three lobes". Trilobites are extinct marine animals. They first appeared in the Cambrian period and dominated the oceans all the way through the Permian period, between 541 and 252 million years ago. They are among the first known arthropods, a group of animals that includes insects, spiders, and crustaceans. Trilobites had segmented bodies, jointed legs, and a hard exoskeleton, which made them well-suited for life in the ocean. They came in a variety of shapes and sizes, ranging from less than an inch to over two feet long. A trilobite could roll up into a ball for protection by curling its tail underneath its head.

Trilobites lived in many ecological niches. Some moved over the seabed as predators, scavengers, or filter feeders; and some swam, feeding on plankton. A few even crawled onto land.

Trilobite fossils are found worldwide, with thousands of known species.

Trilobites molted – they shed their exoskeleton and developed a new one as they grew. Most trilobite fossils are actually fossilized molted exoskeletons.

This is why partial fossils are common. In addition to fossilized body parts, tracks left behind by trilobites living on the sea floor are sometimes preserved as trace fossils. Because they appeared quickly in geological time, trilobites are

index fossils. This means geologists can date the age of the rocks in where trilobite fossils are found.

#### **Trilobite Fossils in Nevada**

Nevada has multiple trilobite sites. They are found in the Pioche Shale and Chisholm Shale formations in Lincoln County, the Poleta formation in Esmeralda County, the Middle Cambrian formation in Nye County, and at the base of the Frenchman Mountains in Clark County. Several trilobite sites are located inside the Nevada Test and Training Range.
