Greetings to my fellow rock-hounds:



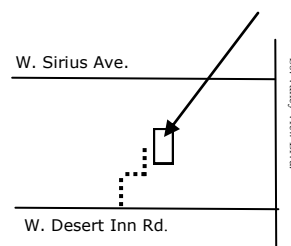

Clark County Paleontology and Geology Factoids *by Doris Currington*

Doris Currington gave a short Show & Tell at the January 2011 meeting. Her charts were not in a completed form that time. Hopefully, when she completes them they will look professional. Whether or not you attended the meeting, if you know of any interesting geological or paleontological Clark County information please pass it on to Doris so she can include it in her charts.

All the phylums are found in Clark County except two, and those two are found in our neighboring Esmeralda County.

Pre-historic Animals found in Clark County: vertebrates - 9; lower vertebrates - 17, birds - 11.

Main evidence of man 1,300 years ago, undocumented 40,000 years. Documented by charcoal and coprolite.

Our own original club member Harrington was involved in the Tule Springs Dig, Gypsum Cave and Overton Indian Restorations.

Invertebrates of Clark County: Cambrian: Trilobites, Track Traces and Worm Leavings; Ordovician: Receptaculities, Algae, Gastropods; Silurian: Algae, Shell Animals; Devonian: Algae, Ocean Animals; Mississippian and Pennsylvanian: all phylums but two; Jurassic: Dino tracks in Calif. only six miles from Clark County.

Oldest living trees exist in Clark County - the Bristlecone Pines.

As noted in the meeting minutes, the faceting equipment is being made functional and the faceting class is expected to start soon. This is an exciting opportunity to study with Bob Skulsky. Examples of his faceting were shown at the Board Meeting, and they are extremely beautiful.

This is another wonderful opportunity to learn a new technique. He expects the class to be 4-5 weeks and start after May 15th. All materials will be provided for a fee of \$75.00. 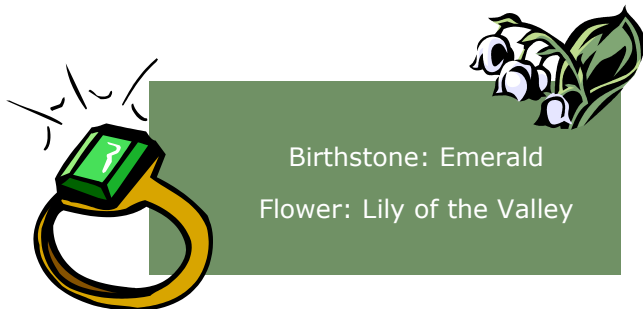

Transparent emerald is extremely rare so emerald with inclusions, called garden, are tolerated.

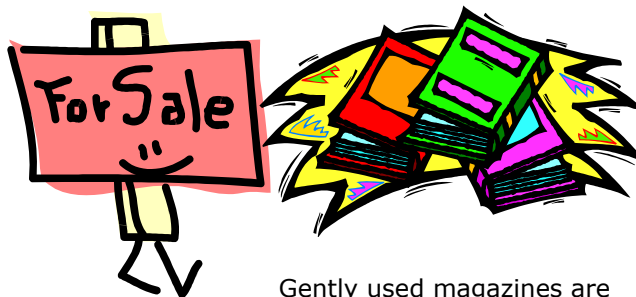
