

SNGMS Board Meeting Minutes, March 30, 2023

The meeting was held at the SNGMS Lapidary Shop starting at 6 pm. Board members attending were: Andrea Packo, President; Orville Wiemers, Vice President; Peggy Sue Moore, Treasurer; Bob Belcher, 3 year Board; Del Walkenshaw, 2 year Board; Ron Mazz, 1 year Board; Lloyd Chayette, 1 year Board/Past President; Jack Toogood, Parliamentarian. Lorrilee Stackhouse, Secretary, absent due to medical reasons.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Minutes of the previous board meeting were read by Peggy Sue Moore, Treasurer and acting Secretary. The minutes were approved as read.

Treasurer's report: Ending balance in checking account is \$20,431.81, showing a loss of \$1,657.92. The SNGMS Lapidary Shop rent has increased to \$1,708.00/month due to CAM charges. The annual audit has been set up with member volunteers

Unfinished business: Discussed locker rentals at the SNGMS Lapidary Shop, selling donated items on Etsy, T-Shirt contest, and current membership of 551 paid members. An email will been sent out as a reminder for members to renew.

Spring Jamboree update: Geodes are needed. Items are needed for Silent Auction at the Jamboree show.

Kid's Club: Refer to the calendar of events. The May 20th meeting topic will be Metal Detecting. The Kids Club committee is looking for metal detecting members to help.

Upcoming events: refer to the calendar of events

Awards Banquet: A vote for a Catered or Pot Luck banquet will be held at the General Membership meeting.

Future Classes: refer to the calendar of events.

Field Trips: The next trip will be to Tonopah, Nevada. Refer to Events Calendar for dates and contact Del Walkenshaw at Desert Art Supply to sign up.

Future speakers: There will be no speaker for the April General Meeting.

New Business: A motion to purchase a new Oxy/Acetylene compressed gas system, not to exceed \$1,000.00 was made by Ron Mazz and seconded by Bob Belcher. A vote was taken and the motion did not pass.

Meeting Adjourned at 7:45pm.



SNGMS General Meeting Minutes, April 3, 2023

The General Membership meeting convened at 6:00 pm. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. The minutes of the previous meeting were read by Peggy Sue Moore, substituting for Lorrilee Stackhouse, Secretary. The minutes were approved as read.

Treasurer's Report: After the most recent deposit, the March closing checking account balance is: \$21,022.76. March ended with a net loss of \$1,066.97. Investments are unchanged.

Unfinished business: The presentation for Viva Las Vegas Rocks Show, proposed for November 3, 2023, was continued since it was cut short at the March 2023 General Meeting due to time constraints. Since a WIFI connection was not available, a graphic display was not available. Orville Wiemers stated that the show budget would not exceed \$27,000.00, with \$21,325.00 going to Santa Fe Station, and a \$3,000.00 advertising budget as part of the overall budget of \$27,000.00. The projected income is \$34,000.00. A motion to approve this show and budget was made by Bruce Martin and seconded by Lloyd Chayette. A lengthy discussion ensued by members both for and against continued for approximately 20 minutes. A vote was held with 46 for and 29 against. The motion passed.

New Business: Chops Wenzl gave a presentation showing a proposed dinner menu with the Sunset Station Casino for the Annual Awards Banquet, to be held in December 2023. A motion was made to vote between having a PotLuck Dinner or a Catered dinner by Chops Wenzl and seconded by Lloyd Chayette. The vote was overwhelmingly in favor of the catered banquet. A second motion was made to accept the Sunset Station proposal and pay the \$1,000.00 deposit to lock in a date with Sunset Station catering department. Member's tickets will be \$30.00 and non-member's tickets will be \$60.00. Tickets will go on sale in the Fall.

The Raffle/Drawing was held during the break.

Spring Jamboree: Volunteers are still needed. We have less than one month before this event. We still need donations for the Silent Auction fund raiser held during the Spring Jamboree.

Cabochon Contest: The theme for this month's contest was Jelly Fish. First place went to Bruce Martin and Second place went to Ron Mazz.

T-shirt Design Contest: The T-shirt design contest was held and the winning design was submitted by Kendra White. 100 T-Shirts will be printed up for sale at the Spring Jamboree. The price will be \$20/shirt as a fund raising project for the Club.

Membership report: There are 551 paid members.

Kid's Club report: The Gold Prospecting badge will be the subject in May. An email will be sent out with the details. The Kids Club committee is looking for members with metal detectors to help.

Sunshine report: Beth Jones gave the Sunshine report. See page 5 for details.

Field Trip report: An email will be sent out by Del Walkenshaw for the Tonopah trip this month. This is a pay-to-dig trip and spots are available.

May Speaker: The speaker at the May 2023 General Meeting will be John Fish. He will discuss lapidary arts and gemology.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:40 pm

Diamond, the April Birthstone




SNGMS Meeting Schedules and Lapidary Shop Hours

Proceeding west on Desert Inn Road, take the first right past South Valley View Blvd. into the industrial park area. 
Lapidary and Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks

Minimize Broken Saw Blades in a Jeweler's German Saw Frame


Check the blade tension

The saw blade **<u>must</u>** be taut in the frame. Once you've loaded the blade in the frame (with teeth facing out and down), flick the blade with your fingernail. A taut saw blade will make a high pitched ping. If you hear a dull sound instead, take the saw blade out and try again. If you can't get the saw blade tight enough, adjust the length of the spring arm (make it longer) with the height adjustment knob.

Work at the correct bench or table height



Hold the metal securely so it doesn't move when you cut it with the saw, otherwise the blade will snap. The most effective way to support your work while cutting is to use a bench pin. A bench pin is a piece of wood with a "V" groove cut into it. The pin is clamped to a bench or table. The bench pin should be mounted at chest height. This keeps your arm in the proper position for maximum sawing efficiency. If you've been trying to saw hunched over, this change will make a big difference.



German Pattern Saw Frame



Don't use a death grip on the saw handle


Instead of tightly gripping the handle of your saw frame, try loosening your grip. Don't push hard on the blade to force it forward while you're sawing. Focus on easy, up and down VERTICAL strokes, and let the saw blade do the work.

Turn the metal, not the saw, to change the direction of a cut


If you turn the saw blade instead of the metal to change the direction of the cut, it's almost certain the blade will break. Turn the metal, not the saw to make a turn. Be sure to keep the blade moving up and down as you turn the metal. This is hard to learn, but it will get easier with practice!

Lubricate the saw blade

When you saw metal, there is friction between the saw blade and the metal. The friction makes it hard to saw. There are several types of cutting lubricants, including waxes and butters, to reduce the friction. Specialty wax for jeweler's saws is a common lubricant. Drag your saw blade once through the lubricant (after the blade is loaded in the saw frame) and you're ready to saw! Reapply the lubricant as needed throughout the sawing process to keep the saw blade moving smoothly through the metal.








Saw Frame Held Vertically for Optimal Cutting

Mineral Musings

A Brief History of Lapidary

Lapidary is the art of shaping stone, minerals, or gemstones into cabochons, engraved gems (like cameos), and faceted designs. But how was this done before electric motors and modern abrasives?

Early Lapidary Arts

The earliest known lapidary is from 4,000 - 2,000 BCE. Jewelry was made from stones with drilled holes. Bruting was used shape stones. Bruting is done by rubbing a soft stone against another harder stone.

Start of Modern Lapidary

Until the 1400s, stones were cut with an abrasive surface or a hammer and chisel. Then, the scaif, a horizontal polishing wheel, was developed in Holland A mixture of olive oil and diamond dust was sprinkled onto a rotating wheel made of

copper, tin, or lead. The scaif made it possible to polish a gemstone symmetrically at angles that best reflected the light.

In 1609, the Dutch began using emery, sapphire, and ruby as abrasives to cut stones instead of diamond dust. It took longer to cut stones with these materials compared to diamond dust, but the abrasives were less expensive and more available.

Revolutionary Changes

During the Industrial Revolution, new tools to cut stones were developed. By 1895, polishing was done on hand-cranked wheels made of copper, tin, pewter (a lead

alloy), or sometimes wood topped with cloth or leather. The polishing agents were diamond powder, ruby powder, tripoli, putty powder, pumice or rouge, always mixed with oil or water. The grinding and polishing powders were each applied to separate grinding or buffing wheels.

The 1900s

By the 1930s, laps plated with diamonds made cutting stones easier. Plated laps meant gem cutters no longer had to grind diamond powder, mix it with oil, and apply it to the lap. They could just put the lap on the machine and start cutting. However, the laps wore out quickly.

In 1954 laps with diamonds sintered into the metal were patented. They were more expensive than other laps, but lasted decades. The sintered laps were too expensive for casual hobbyists, but good for industrial cutting factories. Also in 1954, General Elected created synthetic diamonds, providing abundant and cost-effective diamond powder.

Lapidary became a popular hobby in the United States during the 1950s. The famous Vera Krupp enjoyed cutting stones. She was a German actress and the wealthy ex-wife of an arms dealer who lived on Spring Mountain Ranch near Las Vegas, Nevada. Some of her work is on display today at Spring Mountain State Park.


Lapidary in the 2000s

Most modern lapidary work is done using motorized equipment. Polishing is done with resin- or metal-bonded emery, silicon carbide, aluminum oxide, or diamond dust. Often, the final polish will be done with tin oxide or cerium oxide.


