ROY M. BEESON



Roy M. Beeson passed away on June 30, 2007. He was born November 22, 1914, Moab, UT to Marcus V. and Mary Ann (Stocks) Beeson. He was preceded in death by 2 brothers, 2 sisters and 1 grandson.

He is survived by his wife of 61 years, Nyda Ray (Winbourn), one sister Opal in Texas, 4 daughters: Francis Anderson of Greenville, CA, Joyce Pier of

ED RUPPRECHT

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Who is Ed Rupprecht, you see him at meetings, where he holds court as one of our elder statesman in the rock hound field. The knowledge he holds and has forgotten (as not necessary) is unlimited and at one time there was not a rock that he could not identify or did not like. When you meet him you feel that you are an instant friend, one you want on each of your trips into the wilderness so that you do not have to carry that book that weighs about ten pounds to identify what you find. Here is what I have learned about Ed "The Rock" Rupprecht.

He got his beginning in Elk River, Minnesota. On a fall day, the 24th of October 1925, and when he was fourteen he moved from the city and became a farm boy and started collecting rocks. He started by picking them up and looking at them and then would throw them down again; not knowing at that time what he was looking at was the Lake Superior Banded Agate that is so sought after now. He did keep one piece, a Red, White and Blue one that eventually slipped out of his hands over the years. He kept picking them up and throwing them away until he went into the service in 1947.

He served first in the Army Infantry, in Scotland (at the end of the 2nd World War where he got the WWII Victory Medal) and then Germany. In Germany he started cooking. Coming home for

Discharge and not finding a job he reenlisted in the Army Air Corps as cook and was sent to Fujioka, Japan during the Korean Conflict and received a letter from then President, Harry Truman. When the Army Air Corps split and became the Army and the Air Force he stayed with the Air Force and eventually found himself stationed at Nellis Air Force Base here in Las Vegas, NV. While a Cook at Nellis he started cooking in his off hours at the Alpine Village Inn as the Assistant Head Cook. When he got out of the service he applied for and got a job as Civilian Cook at Nellis Air Base.

While stationed at Nellis Air Base Ed and some of his friends started the Nellis Gem Club. It was Ed, Bruno Syzdek, Mike Stapleton and Anna Parks; they had a 24" Highland Park Slab Saw, and 10" trim saw and three 10" Carborundum wheel grinders for shaping and polishing stones. So that he could continue to use the equipment at Nellis Gem Club he took the job as a civilian cook and also cooked at Mercury, Nevada when they were doing the Nuclear testing there in the fifties. He was Shop Foreman and Cabochon carving instructor over the years.

In 1953 he joined the Clark County Gem and Mineral Club. He helped them build their first workshop in 1954 using wood he donated that he purchased by bidding on a contract to demolish some old buildings on Nellis Air Force Base. This shop was at the home of Tom Amondson on Lincoln Rd. in North Las Vegas. This shop had a 24" Slab saw; 10" trim saw and a two wheel 10" Carborundum grinder for shaping and polishing stones. He helped with shop maintenance and was Field Trip Chairman along with Keith Groves for several years for this group. During this time while Rock hounding throughout the Southwestern states he found a very beautiful multi colored Jasper in the area of Enterprise, Utah and for about a year had a mineral claim there to mine what he had discovered and named "Indian Blanket Jasper".

In 1954 while prospecting in the Monte Cristo Mountains he discovered the deposit of "Bulls Eye Rhyolite" that we all have several field trips to each year to this day.

In the mid 60's he also became a member of the Las Vegas Gem and Mineral Club as he had friends in both clubs. In 1966 he was the Layout

chairman for the big California Federation of Mineral Societies show here in Las Vegas.

In the early 90's the shop was moved from North Las Vegas to the Southwest (Valley View and Tropicana) area of town occupying a portion of a building where the brother-in-law of Scott Cramer had his business. Ed was shop foreman here with Jerry Bertschai as well as being part of the speakers' bureau. He has entertained and informed numerous school children in Clark County Schools and given them a glimpse of the beauty that abounds around us here in the Southwest...Also at Lee Canyon a Senor group. When this building was sold and the club had to move all the saws, they were moved to Ed's back yard where they were covered and stored waiting to be moved to a new workshop.

In the mid 90's along with his wife he had claims on some opal mines in the Virgin Valley area.

In the late 90's Ed bought a Quonset Hut and with other club members physical labor assembled it on the back part of his property giving the club use of about half the interior of the building for its workshop. He was shop foreman and provided general maintenance for the clubs equipment often cannibalizing his own equipment to keep the clubs machines working. He also poured a slab and constructed a shelter for a saw shed for the club's Slab saws. He built or acquired all the tables and benches for the club to use in the workshop. In 2005 the club moved out of Ed's workshop and has now found a space of their own in the Las Vegas Arts District. He is a teacher with unequalled knowledge and patience to teach someone the great beauty of nature. He still works the shows and provides displays for them. Through out the years he has never refused to help when asked. Ed devoted most of his free time to teaching, maintaining, promoting and supporting the Gem Clubs in this valley since the early 1950's.

Also in addition he held the following full time jobs: From 1953 to 1977 he was a Cook at a number of locations in the area. From 1977 to 1991 he worked as a Masonry Laborer with Harry Scott and Tom Yeley. From 1991 to 1997 he owned and operated his own Landscape maintenance Company. In 1997 at the age of 72 he finally decided to retire and go to work at his passion, that

He loved the out-of-doors, camping, boating, fishing, hunting, and eventually, rock hounding. When Richard was in high school, he took a lapidary class and Roy started building saws, grinders, and polishers. It quickly took up most of his time and energy. He was an artist and craftsman. Most of the people who came into contact with him have a piece of his jewelry. He loved to "show" his collections at rock club meeting, shows and his special was 5th graders at Martha King Elementary School in Boulder City. For thirteen years all of the 5th graders made the trek to the Beeson house where he had set up many displays. Of course the "free table" and the "junk pile" were the favorite of the students. He loved to teach anyone who wanted to learn about rocks, minerals, and processes of lapidary.

Roy and Nyda both belonged to both rock clubs in Las Vegas before they joined the Boulder City Club and the Taylorsville, CA Gem and Mineral Club and exhibited at all functions he attended. He donated exhibits to McCaw School of Mines in Henderson, NV and Sandy Searles Miller Academy for International Studies in Las Vegas, NV and several libraries in Clark County, NV.


