Must include a rock, mineral or any type of crystals (including bead crystals)

No visible identification marks to indicate its creator(s)

All entries must be registered and present 30 minutes prior to the start of the event

The centerpiece can either be donated to the Club as a prize, or the creator can chose to keep it

Every centerpiece will be issued a number at the time of registration for the purpose of voting. During the event, members will have the opportunity to vote on the best centerpiece via a secret ballot.





Other - \$5.00 for first hour; prorated \$1.25 per additional 1/4 hour increment



BLAST FROM THE PAST 1966 CONVENTION AND NATIONAL SHOW AT LAS VEGAS, MAY 12-15

The theme of the Combined American and California Federations of Mineralogical Societies Convention and National show to be held at Las Vegas, Nevada will be "Around the World With Gems and Minerals." The Host society is the Clark County Gem Collectors. The special exhibits were secured that would represent as many of the gem and mineral areas of the world as possible and the following exhibits will be shown. The Smithsonian Institution is preparing a collection of gems and minerals representative of various countries throughout the world and is featuring the world's largest and finest star ruby. From Japan they have secured an exhibit which will display the native gems and lapidary art by members of one of Japan's largest gem and mineral clubs. The exhibit from India will display rubies and sapphires, as well as some antique Indian jewelry with typical enameling, gold work, and precious stones. The Uruguay exhibit has an unusual selection of geodes and sections lined with amethyst. The Australian exhibit is a large 100 pound piece of black fire opal in matrix. There

will be many other special exhibits in addition to the competitive and non-competitive exhibits.

Approximately 200 rooms have been reserved at the Stardust Hotel for those wishing to attend the convention, Camping sites will be available at the Lake Mead campsite. There will be some camper and trailer accommodations in a huge parking area near the convention site, but there will be no sewage "hookups" and no water or electrical "hook-ups". However, the area will be well lighted with large flood lights. For further information concerning the camping information contact the show chairman, Col. Daniel L. Muilaly, P.O.
