SNGMS General Meeting Minutes for 5/5/2025







Rock Spotlight Mohs Hardness Scale

The Mohs Hardness Scale helps identify minerals. A mineral's hardness is a measure of its resistance to scratching. Resistance is measured by scratching the mineral against something of known hardness on the Mohs Hardness Scale. This graphic below lists some minerals and common objects that can be used to determine a mineral's hardness. This method is especially useful for identifying minerals in the field because you can test for hardness with common objects (e.g., fingernail, penny, nail). The scale is named for its creator, the German geologist and mineralogist Friedrich Mohs.




Location of the Eagles' Lodge

Lapidary/Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks Lapidary Adhesives

Adhesives are sometimes used to mend cracked stones, create inlays, and attach stones to other materials such as metal, wood, and leather. They can also be used to stabilize stones. Two common types of adhesives are super glues and two-part epoxies.

What is Super Glue?

Super glue is also called cyanoacrylate or CA glue. Ethyl cyanoacrylate and methyl methacrylate are the major players in super glue. The ethyl cyanoacrylate makes the glue bond quickly and creates a strong hold. The methyl methacrylate makes the glue resistant to shear, peel, and impact stresses. Combining these chemicals produces a strong glue.

You can buy super glue as a liquid, gel, or spray. The liquids are very thin and usually dry within 2 minutes. Gels are thicker, and take longer (30 minutes or more) to dry. You can use gels for vertical or overhead surfaces. Spray super glues dry in 1-3 minutes and can be used over fairly large areas, but sprays are not recommended for detailed work like jewelry.



Starbond CA Glue

Paleobond and Starbond are CA glues that are often used to repair cracked stones or to stabilize them. Paleobond is specifically formulated for stones and fossils, but it is more expensive than Starbond. Both types of adhesives come in different viscosities ranging from thin to thick. The thick version can be used to fill gaps, while the thin version can be dripped on a stone and allowed to penetrate and stabilize the stone.

What is Epoxy Adhesive?

Two-part epoxy adhesive is made of a resin and a hardener. Resin is a type of chemical called polyepoxide. When a hardener is mixed with the resin, the hardener triggers creation of molecular chains. The chains are strong and they last a long time. Epoxy can tolerate exposure to solvents, and it resists sunlight and high temperatures.

Epoxy can take 30 minutes to 24 hours to cure. Temperature and humidity affect the cure time. The working time (pot life) is the time you have to work with the mixed epoxy before it thickens and become difficult to use. As the epoxy cures, it goes through four stages:

- 1) Liquid Stage immediately after mixing, the epoxy is a liquid, ready to be applied
- 2) Gel Stage as epoxy hardens, it becomes gel-like, sticky, and thicker
- 3) Initial Cure the epoxy starts to harden, and you can handle it
- 4) Full Cure the epoxy reaches its maximum strength, typically within 3-7 days



Two Part Epoxy

Epoxy can be used to attach stones to metal or wood. You can glue stones and pearls into settings, or attach them to earring posts with epoxy. Epoxy can be used to fix broken jewelry pieces, such as cementing broken stones back into place.

Tips for Working with Acrylic Glue and Epoxy

- 1) Careful surface preparation increases bond strength by 20–50% and the bond lasts longer. Remove oils or dust from surfaces before gluing by wiping them with rubbing alcohol. Surface sanding improves bond strength for metal
- 2) Gently mix resin and hardeners to avoid creating bubbles which weaken bonds. Spread the glue evenly over the parts to be attached. Apply enough glue to fill gaps.
- 3) Check the adhesive's curing instructions carefully. Allow the glue to dry properly so it comes to full strength. Avoid cold or humid environments (usually not a problem in Las Vegas).

Mineral Musings Simplot Silica Sand Mine In Overton, Nevada

J.R. Simplot Company is a privately-held company, incorporated in Nevada, with its corporate office in Boise, Idaho. John Richard "Jack" Simplot began his career when he quit school in the eighth grade, at age 14, leaving home to strike out on his own in 1923 to work on a farm near Delco, Idaho.



1940s, Simplot began providing the military with dehydrated onions and potatoes to support the war effort. Starting in the 1950s, billions of dollars flowed into Simplot from a frozen French fries process developed by one of its scientists. The company became the primary supplier of French fries to McDona

He founded the Simplot Company 1929 at age 20. In the early

The company's diversification strategy involves expanding into markets beyond its core business of potato processing and frozen foods. This includes agriculture, phosphate production, livestock operations, and products like fertilizers and silica sand. The company has a global presence with operations in Australia, Canada, Mexico, and China.

Simplot's silica sand mine in Overton, Nevada produces high-quality silica sand made up of more than 99% pure silica dioxide. Silica is an ingredient in solar panels and circuit boards. Growth in the solar panel industry is expected to increase demand for silica sand. It's also used to make glass, grout, cement, and insulation. All of the windows in Simplot's corporate headquarters are made from silica sand mined in Overton! Corona beer bottles and automotive glass in Tesla car windows are also made with Overton sand.

Silica sand is only mined in one location in Nevada, at the Simplex Silica Sand Mine in Overton. The Overton mine has been in operation since 1927. The sand is washed with water to remove fine materials and clay, and to separate the sand into specific size ranges. The facility produces four grades of sand based on coarseness.

There have been some operating problems at the Overton mine. In February 2004, J.R. Simplot Company agreed to pay a \$525,000 fine and to install \$2 million worth of air pollution control equipment because of violations of the Clean Air Act. The violations occurred in 1988 when the company removed equipment required to control emissions of air pollutants.

On June 23, 2006, a former Simplot employee crashed through a security gate at the Simplot mine in Overton. He destroyed equipment, started fires, and caused millions of dollars in damage. Firefighters and the Nevada Highway Patrol responded. The suspect attacked a fire truck, and a Highway Patrolman killed him.

The company sponsors community events. An example is the Simplot Games, a high school indoor track and field event. The Games are held annually at Idaho State University in Pocatello, Idaho. They are considered one of the nation's premier indoor track and field meets. The Simplot Games are an open meet, meaning athletes don't need to meet specific qualifying times or distances to compete.
