SNGMS Board Meeting Minutes for 2/1/2024

On February 1, 2024, the regular Board of Directors meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at the SNGMS Lapidary Shop at 6:09 pm by the President. All Board members were present. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was recited. The minutes of the January 4, 2024 meeting were approved as read.

Shop Report: All equipment is up and running. Cabinets have been hung on the wall and bookshelves for the library will be constructed beneath them. The rock shelves will be restocked and the back storage room cleaned out. Plan is to tile the office later this year.

Treasurers Report: Balance of checking account is \$27,047 and is staying stable, with the increase mainly due to Spring Jamboree booth sales. The investments balance is \$124,228. The Board discussed 'safe' cash balances and the possibility of investing some of the brokerage cash balance in short term instruments such as T-bills or CDs that provide both liquidity and safety. This will be further discussed at future meetings.

Shop Report: All equipment is up and running. Needed parts have been ordered.

New Business: Kerry "Chops" Wenzl reports that Station Casino raised the price for the Awards Banquet by \$3 per person. If the club wants to secure the event venue a \$500 check deposit needs to be made. The ticket cost would be \$35 per member, \$60 per non-member. Del Walkenshaw proposed, seconded by Orville Weimers, and approved by the Board that a proposal to secure Station Casino for the Awards Banquet be presented at the General Meeting.

Del Walkenshaw presented a proposal to purchase banners and lighting for club use at upcoming shows. The Board approved presenting proposal at General Meeting.

Unfinished Business: Classes: Amber Palecek is presenting a clock class on Feb 18 & 19 and it filled up rapidly. A Gemstone ID class is being discussed for Spring.

The Spring Jamboree and Viva Las Vegas shows were discussed with a status update from Orville Wiemers. The banner layout and a proposed handout for the Viva Show were reviewed by the Board.

There was a proposal to give new members 1 hour of shop time. The Board felt that it would be appropriate when they attend an orientation session at the Shop.

An opportunity for community outreach at a Science and Literature Fair at Gene Ward Elementary School was proposed by Jean Chayette, and the Board enthusiastically supported the proposal.

The Board will discuss time and location of Board meetings at next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:16 pm.

SNGMS General Meeting Minutes for 2/5/2024

On February 5^{th,} 2023, the regular meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at 6 PM by the President. The Secretary was present. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was recited. The minutes of the January 8^{th,} 2023 meeting were approved as read.

Treasurers Report: The checking balance as of end of January was \$27,104, up over \$3,000 from the previous month mainly due to Spring Jamboree booth sales. The Brokerage account balance was \$100, 135 in investments and \$24,092 in cash.

Membership: Claudia Crouse reports that the membership list has not been officially purged but expects to have about half the number remaining following the purge of those who have not continued their membership.

Kids Club: Wendy Dresser reported on the Kid's Club activities, thanking Mary Beth Paladino and her family, and additional members for making sure the Kid's Club Holiday/Awards Party was a success, and for pitching in to make the January meeting happen. There will be a field trip to trilobite hill on Sunday.

Lapidary Shop Report: "Chops" Wenzl reported that there are two saws down and waiting for parts. The Shop will be closed Feb 14 from 3-7 PM.

Publicity: Romy Umholtz reported that there is no speaker this month but she presented the slate of speakers for the rest of 2024 and discussed possible presenters for the Viva Las Vegas Show this Fall.

Sunshine: Harvey Bergeron is having leg and foot problems, and Rita Bergeron is also under the weather. Lori Syddall had a good checkup.

Cabochon Contest: The theme was Forest Colors. First place was Mary Savage. Second place was Joel Coombs. March 2024 subject will be Spring Flowers.

Rock Spotlight: Fluorite

Fluorite (also called fluorspar) is the mineral form of calcium fluoride, CaF2. It is soft, with a Mohs value of 4. Pure fluorite is colorless and transparent, both in visible and ultraviolet (UV) light. Impurities usually make it a colorful mineral in visible and UV light. Fluorite also exhibits the property of thermoluminescence – the mineral fluoresces when it's heated.


In 1852, the word "fluorescence" was coined by physicist George Stokes from "fluorspar" plus "escence". The name of the element "fluorine" is also based on the word "fluorite".


The stone has ornamental and lapidary uses. Industrially, fluorite is used as a flux for iron smelting, and in the production of certain glasses and enamels. The purest grades of fluorite are a source of fluoride for hydrofluoric acid manufacture. Optically clear transparent fluorite lenses are used in microscopes and telescopes.

Fluorite usually forms through hydrothermal activity. It may occur as a vein deposit, especially in limestones. Fluorite can also be found as a constituent of sedimentary rocks either as grains or as the cementing material in sandstone.

There are multiple places in Nevada where fluorite is found. SNGMS members Sara Tredwell, Jonathan Tredwell, Katie Frank, and Josh Solberg manage a fluorite site near Austin, Nevada

Fluorite comes in a wide range of colors and has been called "the most colorful mineral in the world". The most common colors are purple, blue, green, yellow, or colorless. Pink, red, white, brown, and black colors are more unusual. Colors may occur in bands.



Lapidary/Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks

Simple Clothespin Vise

CLOTHESPIN VISE

Have you ever ground your fingernails down to the cuticle while polishing tiny stones or shaving off an edge for inlay? To help minimize skin loss, you can make a clothespin vise to hold small pieces. The original version of this vise was developed by lapidary expert Lee Yazzie. The tool is simple to make and holds the tiniest stones firmly. These items are needed to make the clothespin vice:


Standard wooden clothespin Heavy rubber band 1 piece of coarse sandpaper, or a file, or a grinder, or a jeweler's saw

To make the tool, follow these steps:

1) Find a wooden clothespin with a metal spring that is similar to this one:



2) Sand, grind, file, or cut both clothespin halves so the tips slope back towards the thin end of the pin half, and blunt the tip:



3) Wrap the space between the spring and the reshaped ends of the clothespin halves with a rubber band (one that is 2.5 inches long when folded in half, and 0.25 inches wide works well) to give the vise more clamping power:



4) Use your new clamp to hold tiny pieces of stone – open the vise by pressing on the thin ends of the vise! The vise can also hold small pieces of metal for shaping.

Mineral Musings

Fluorescent Minerals and the Sterling Hill Mining Museum in New Jersey

The Franklin-Sterling Hill area of New Jersey has more fluorescent minerals than anywhere else on Earth. There are two geology museums in the area, about four miles apart: the Franklin Mineral Museum which showcases regional zinc mines, and the Sterling Hill Mining Museum which has a world-class collection of fluorescent rocks. The Sterling Hill Mining Museum is an old zinc mine. It's one of the oldest in the country, since it opened in 1739, before the Revolutionary War! The mine was in operation until 1986. The abandoned mine was purchased in 1989 by brothers Richard and Robert Hauck. It became a museum in 1990. Every year, about 40,000 people visit the museum. The facility includes outdoor and indoor mining exhibits, an underground mine tour, and the Thomas S. Warren Museum of Fluorescence,

About 15 percent of the Earth's minerals fluoresce under ultraviolet light (also called UV light or blacklight). UV light shining on these minerals is absorbed into the rock. The light reacts with chemicals in the rocks. Energy from the reaction is released as a


these minerals is absorbed into the rock. The light reacts with chemicals in the rocks. Energy from the reaction is released as a glow (fluorescence). Different types of UV—longwave and shortwave—can produce different colors from the same rock. Some rocks that have other materials inside them (called activators) may glow multiple colors.

The fluorescence exhibits are in the Sterling Hill mine's old mill. At the entrance, more than 100 huge fluorescent mineral specimens cover an entire wall that's lit up by different types of ultraviolet light, displaying the glowing capabilities of each mineral type. For kids, there's a cave with a fluorescent volcano, a castle, and some glowing wildlife. And there's an exhibit of fluorescent rocks and minerals from Greenland.

Among the most impressive parts of the Sterling Hill mine tour is the walk through the Rainbow Tunnel, which ends in an entirely fluorescent room called the Rainbow Room. The walk is lit by UV light, causing bursts of glowing, neon reds and greens from the exposed zinc ore in the walls. The green color reveals a type of zinc ore called willemite. The color of willemite can vary wildly in the daylight, everything from reddish-brown to blues and greens, but under UV it all fluoresces bright neon green.
