The treasurer gave her report: The net income for June was positive. There was a motion by John Stackhouse, seconded by Ernie Parrish and adopted for payment of outstanding bills.










#### **Finding the Shop Location**


Proceeding west on Desert Inn Road, take the first right past So. Valley View Blvd. into the industrial park area. Drive past the building on your right, then jog right, then left and you will be in front of Building E.

New users just need to come in, we'll even give you a slab to make your first cabochon from. No additional equipment or experience is necessary, we have everything you need to get started doing lapidary work, and will teach you all the basics at any time that the shop is open.

Please bring your 2013 membership card with you when you come to use the shop's resources so we can verify your current membership. If you haven't paid your dues yet you can do so at the shop and the supervisor can issue your card.

The Shop will be closed on Tuesdays and Thursdays during the Summer.



Please donate brown paper bags and paper towels to the shop. The paper towels are used to clean and the bags are needed for straining the used oil so it can be reclaimed. Your donations can be brought to the shop or to the August meeting. Thanks you!



#### Procedures for using the Loratone Saw (B saw)

- 1. Be sure to loosen the thumb screws (wing screws) on the right side of the rock vise before adjusting the depth of cut.
- 2. Set the Depth of cut using the calibrated wheel on right (crank handle).
- 3. Retighten the thumb screws. Only finger tight, DO NOT USE ANY TOOLS TO TIGHTEN!
- 4. Adjust the vice and rock to sit 1/8'' in front of the blade.
- 5. Hook up switch chain leaving enough slack so that the stone will be completely cut through and turn off the saw. Saves you money!
- 6. Close cover completely.
- 7. Turn on saw.
- 8. When saw turns off leave cover closed for at least 3 minutes to let the oil spray settle and the rock to drain off.
- 9. Open cover (if slab is in bottom if saw let sit on shelf in saw to drain while you set your next cut.

10.Please refer to step one before adjusting for the next cut.
