Puzzle Answers **Polished Slab Advertising Rates** 16 The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is seeking input about their efforts to better manage the Mojave Trails National Monument. BLM is trying to define what activities are, and are not, acceptable in the Monument. Some roads are expected to be closed and some, if not all, rockhounding could be prohibited. Some of the places where we collect could be affected such as South Cadys, Ludlow, and Lavic.

The BLM wants substantive input to assist in this planning effort. The comment period will end on June 20, 2023. The type of input that will assist BLM are comments that accomplish the following:

- 1. Identify planning issues.
- 2. Help develop management alternatives which could meet the BLM's purpose and need.
- 3. Provide data and information to inform the planning process.
- 4. Identify issues for analysis. An issue will be analyzed if:
 - a. Analysis of the issue is necessary to choose among alternatives; or
 - b. The issue may have a potentially significant environmental impact.
- 5. Provide information that would be of use in analyzing environmental effects of the action.
- 6. Provide alternative means by which the BLM could meet its purpose & need for the proposal.

Sheri Johnson gave an excellent presentation on this topic at our June 2023 meeting. We all need to submit a letter to the BLM either by email or snail mail. Letters must arrive at BLM before June 20, 2023 when the comment deadline closes. Each letter needs to be different because this could affect each of us differently. Some topics you might mention in your letter include:

- 1. Who we are and what we do we collect rocks for educational purposes
- 2. Our finds are for personal use and display only
- 3. We are stewards of the land and strive to leave the land as we found it
- 4. We train our families to guide future generations about land use and to minimize impact
- 5. We provide scholarship opportunities through the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies for geologic sciences
- 6. Time in the desert provides mental health benefits and a more active lifestyle
- 7. We enjoy the flowers and the wildlife in the Mojave Trails areas
- 8. If you know them, mention which roads are important to leave open

For more information, watch for Sheri Johnson's email discussing this issue further. There are groups discussing these issues on Facebook, including Explorers of the Mojave Desert, Mojave Desert Heritage and Cultural Association, and the Mojave Desert Group.

This interactive tool provides invaluable guidance and suggestions to help compose effective emails. The drafts emails are a starting point. Feel free to infuse the emails with anecdotes, nuance, and your unique insights.

Access the draft email generator by visiting https://bit.ly/BLM-Emails (if the link doesn't work, please try https://chat.openai.com/share/d06628e4-4593-4f22-b0e2-ffd769161e09). You will be taken to the Mojave National Preserve Information page and invited to "continue this conversation." Sign-up and you will be able to generate multiple email responses for free. Use the arrow on the right to scroll down to the prompt.

What is a prompt?

PROMPT example: "...Create an email that discusses how the proposed changes will affect the education of scouts, citizen scientists and rockhounds...include a thread on stewardship and a tenet from the AFMS Code..."

Quick Tips and Note: If you sign-up keep in mind that the session is public, please do not add personal information

Limit questions/emails to the BLM proposed changes- create a new session for personal use. In some instances, you may need to educate the AI on a topic. Feel free to provide accurate concise information.

Presentation: Harrison Brooks showed drone footage from field trips to the Tonapah, Nevada area. He answered many members' questions on drone usage.



Pearl, the June Birthstone

Pearls are organic gems that grow inside living saltwater or freshwater oysters and mussels (mollusks). Pearls form when the mollusk secretes nacre around an irritant like a piece of sand inside its shell.

In the past, only a few pearls were available. They would be accidentally found by divers foraging for food. In 1893, the Japanese innovator Kokichi Mikimoto figured out how to grow pearls in oysters. These cultured pearls were sold at a reasonable price and demand skyrocketed. Today, there are saltwater and freshwater pearl farms where the oysters are cleaned, protected from predators, and eventually harvested. Thousands of years of pearl fishing have decimated natural oyster beds, so cultured pearls are now the majority of pearl sales.





Lapidary/Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks: Drilling Holes in Stones

Excerpted from Gemstone Tumbling, Cutting, Drilling & Cabochon Making, A Simple Guide to Finishing Rough Stones

There are two techniques to manually drill a hole in a stone: 1) Face drilling a hole all the way through the stone so it can be hung from a chain, cord, or jump ring. 2) Top drilling a hole about 1/4 inch into the stone so a jewelry post can be glued into the hole. A post in the girdle of the stone can be used to suspend the final piece of jewelry, or as a decorative element. Equipment and supplies for drilling holes are discussed below.

Safety Glasses. Safety glasses are essential to protect your eyes from flying rock chips during drilling.


Rough Stone. Don't drill polished cabochons. Fully polished stones make it hard to get the hole started, and you won't be able to polish away imperfections caused by drilling.


Drill. The SNGMS Lapidary Shop has a standard drill press you can use to drill holes. You can also use a flex shaft or a Dremel tool. When using a Dremel, don't let any part of the tool except the bit get wet to avoid a nasty shock. This is not a problem when using a drill press or a flex shaft because the power supply is isolated from the drill bit.

Drill Bits. Use diamond-tipped hollow-core drill bits. They last the longest and make the most precise holes. Hollow bits allow water to flow inside the bit as you drill, helping to cool the bit and remove rock debris. Holes on the side of the bit can be used to remove stuck debris with a pin. Use 1 - 2.5 mm diameter bits, with a maximum diameter of 4 mm. The stone should be at least twice as wide as the diameter of the hole you plan to drill.

Small Wood Board In A Tray. The board is a piece of scrap wood that is bigger than the stone. It is placed inside the tray with the stone on top as shown in the picture below. When the drill bit hits the board, stop drilling so you don't drill into the tray. The board should fit comfortably inside the tray. The tray should be deep enough so that the board and stone are completely covered by water when the tray is filled. You can attach the board to the tray with floral clay to minimize movement during drilling. If you use floral clay, it may work better with a wood, ceramic, or glass tray rather than plastic. Test it! You can also attach the stone to the board with floral clay. Or you can just hold them together with your hand.

- 2. Layer the board and stone inside the tray as shown. Fill the tray with enough water (or cooling fluid) to cover the top of the stone.
- 3. Load the diamond-tipped hollow-core drill bit into the drill chuck. Place the tray below the bit, and position the mark on the stone directly below the drill bit. WITHOUT turning on the drill, gently lower the bit until it just touches the stone to make sure it is lined up with the mark, then raise the bit.
- **4.** Use a press-and-release technique to drill the hole. DRILL SLOWLY. Press the bit down a little, pull back, and repeat. This prevents debris buildup and lets water flush the drill hole and cool the bit. Use one-second intervals: one second pressing the drill down into the stone, and one second up. Count out loud press down on the odd numbers, and lift up on the even numbers. For hard stones like agate and jasper, it takes about 100 presses to get all the way through the stone.
- **5.** Don't drill all the way through stones thicker than 1/8", especially hard stones like agate or quartz. Drill partway through from each side to avoid breaking out the back side of the stone as the drill bit comes through.
- **6.** Ease up on the pressure as you drill deeper into the stone. If you are drilling all the way through a stone, easing the pressure minimizes breakout on the reverse side of the stone. Flipping the stone to finish the hole over gives a consistent, smooth hole on both sides of the stone.



Mineral Musings Amazing Agate

The amazing colors and patterns of agate have won the hearts of rockhounds everywhere. Agate has been used in jewelry for thousands of years. Today, it is cut into cabochons, beads, small sculptures, paperweights, and bookends. Industrial uses of agate include manufacture of leather burnishing tools, weighing scales, clock pendulums, and mortars and pestles.

What is Agate?

Agate is a variety of chalcedony, a microcrystalline form of quartz, with a wide variety of colors and a hardness of about 7 on the Mohs scale. The natural colors of agate come from traces of oxides of iron, manganese, titanium, chromium, nickel, and other elements. Iron produces a red or purple color, titanium creates blue, nickel or chromium leads to green, and manganese gives pink crystals. Agate is porous and is easy to dye. Most stones sold commercially are dyed.

Although often found within igneous rocks, agate can form in other rock types. Agate formation starts when groundwater containing silica (sand or quartz) seeps into a rock crack or cavity and dries up, leaving behind a layer of minerals.

As the process repeats, multiple layers of minerals build up in the rock following the outline of the crack or cavity. Different layers or bands of color form as water containing different chemicals seeps into the crack or cavity. The banding gives agate the colors and patterns that make it a popular gemstone.

Once the space is full, the layers crystalize. Quartz crystals often grow in any unfilled cavity spaces to form geodes.

Where Are Agates Found?

Agates are found throughout the world. One of the earliest commercial centers for agate mining and cutting was the Idar-Oberstein district in southwest Germany (the mines played out over a 400 year period). Globally, most agates are now supplied by Brazil and Uruguay. In the United States, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Montana are the main commercial sources of agates. Locally, you can find agate at the SNGMS Ore Car Mining Claim in the Lake Mead Recreation Area. The claim is located at Mile Marker 16 off of North Shore Road.

Types of Agate

Agates are classified by their color patterns. The colors can occur in concentric layers, or as plant-shaped inclusions.

Banded agates have layers of color. Moss, plume, and dendritic agates have inclusions rather than bands of color. They are sometimes mistaken for fossils. Fire agates are iridescent due to limonite inclusions. Shell agates have silicified shells embedded in them. Turritella agate is a type of shell agate. Agate can replace organic components of fossilized trees to form petrified wood.
