

#### Aquamarine, the March Birthstone

The name "aquamarine" comes from the Latin words for seawater – aqua for water and marina for sea. Ancient mariners claimed the gem would calm waves and keep sailors safe at sea. It was also thought to bring happiness in marriage.

Aquamarine is a variety of a mineral called beryl. It is lightly colored with green and blue from iron in the mineral. The color is usually more intense in larger stones, and dark blue stones are expensive. Aquamarine is a pleochroic gem, meaning that its color looks different depending on which direction you look at the crystal.

Aquamarine grows in large, six-sided crystals that can be up to a foot long. This gemstone is mined mainly in Brazil, but it is also found in Nigeria, Madagascar, Zambia, Pakistan, and Mozambique. U.S. sources include the Mount Antero area of Colorado (it's the state gem) and California's Riverside and San Diego counties.

With a Mohs hardness of 7.5 to 8, it requires no special care, and is one of the easiest gems to polish. Aquamarine responds well to heat-treatment, which enhances the bright blue color. It is standard practice to heat stones after they have been faceted. Heat treatment is safe for the gem and it is permanent, so the color doesn't fade or change over time.



In 1936 Brazilian President Getúlio gave Eleanor Roosevelt this aquamarine. It weighs about 1,298 carats and is the second largest aquamarine in the world. It's known as the Roosevelt Aquamarine



# Using Dopping Wax to Cut Cabochons from Mike Rhea

Dopping wax is used to secure (dop) a stone onto a rod (dopstick) for grinding and lapping. Some people use superglue as a dop, but we are sticking with wax in this article. Dowel rods or nails with flattened points are usually used for dop sticks. Dopping a stone helps you move it across grinding surfaces so cabochons have a better finish while saving your fingers from wear and tear. Because it takes time to melt the wax, dopping several stones at once can save time in the long run.

#### **Materials**

Preform cabochon with a flat back (trimmed to its rough outline)
Dop wax (green wax is all-purpose and melts at 150 degrees F)
Dop stick
Heat source like a dopping station or alcohol lamp
Bowl of water
Small container of sand and cigarette lighter (optional)

#### How to Dop a Stone

Melt about 1/3 a stick of dop wax and heat a preform cabochon to 150 °F using a dopping station. Dopping stations cost about \$40 (there is a dopping station at the SNGMS Lapidary Shop). They include a lip around the wax pot for heating stones. It takes about 20 minutes to melt the wax and heat stones. Alternatively, use an alcohol lamp, but you have less control over the temperature of the wax and it can be difficult to heat stones evenly.



**Dopping Station** 

Dip the end of a dop stick into the melted wax. Twist the stick and coat it with wax about 3/4 inch deep. You want enough wax to start a slow drip when removed from the reservoir. Press the waxed end onto the flat BACK of the cabochon. Wet your fingers with water, and shape and press the melted wax onto the stone. Shape the wax into a trumpet shape, funneling up from the dop stick and flaring out on the back of the cab. Now cool the wax to room temperature with the dop stick standing straight up. If it won't stand up, put the handle-end of the stick into a small container of sand. If needed, re-heat the wax with a lighter until it's soft enough to move and adjust the stick position (don't do this with a heat sensitive stone).

After the wax is cool, you're ready to go! Start grinding and polishing.

#### **Types of Dop Wax**

**Dop Sticks** 

There are three types of dop wax: green, red, and black. Each color of wax melts at different temperatures. Green dop wax is the most common, melting at 150 °F and is suitable for most popular rocks used for cabbing. Green dop wax costs about \$12/pound, and can be used over and over again as long as you take care of it. This means covering COOLED wax to keep dust off it.



**Cabbing with a Dopped Rock** 

Dop sticks are usually wooden dowels 3-4 inches long. They can vary in thickness depending on the size of your cab.

#### How to Remove a Stone From Dop Stick

Once you're done grinding a cabochon, you need remove it from the dop stick by cooling the wax. Put the dop stick in a freezer for 10 minutes. Some people submerge the stick in ice water. This risks damaging the stone due to fast temperature changes. When the wax is cold and hard, pop the cabochon off the dop stick. If needed, try twisting it, or pushing it down on a table at an angle to separate it from the stick. If wax is stuck on the back of the cabochon, scrape it off. Scrape off remaining wax from the dop stick over a piece of paper, making it easier to collect. Save the scraped-off wax for reuse. You can reuse dop sticks almost indefinitely.



# **Mineral Musings**

#### Sandstone

Sometimes it's easy to forget so common a rock as sandstone, but it deserves a closer look. It is the second most common sedimentary rock after shale. Ten to twenty percent of the sedimentary rocks in the Earth's crust are sandstones.

Nevada designated sandstone as the official state rock in 1987. A fifth grade class at Gene Ward Elementary School in Las Vegas promoted this Nevada symbol. At the school, there is a sign and a large pink sandstone honoring the designation.

Sandstone is found throughout Nevada. It provides some of Nevada's most spectacular scenery, including Valley of Fire State Park and Red Rock Canyon

National Conservation Area. Sandstone is a sedimentary rock made of sand-size

rock formations allow the percolation of water and oil. The rocks are porous enough to store large quantities of liquids, making them valuable aquifers and petroleum reservoirs.

#### **How Sandstone Forms**

Sandstone forms when sand layers are buried under sediments. Ground water that moves through the sand layers carries dissolved minerals which precipitate and bind individual sand grains into solid rock. The most common binding agents are quartz, calcite, and iron oxides. Fossils can be found in sandstone. Fossilized dinosaur footprints have been found in the sandstone cliffs at Red Rock Canyon.

#### **Sandstone Colors**

Sandstone may be any color due to impurities within the minerals, but the most common colors are tan, brown, yellow, red, grey, pink, white, and black. The sand grains in sandstone are often covered with iron which gives variable shades of red to the rock.

#### **Uses of Sandstone**

Sandstone has been used since prehistoric times for construction, decorative art works, and tools. It is widely used around the world for temples, churches, homes and other buildings, and for asphalt pavement. Grindstones are

made from non-friable sandstone. Northern Nevada sandstone was used to build a number of prominent buildings in Carson City, including the state Capitol. The stone was quarried from the

grounds of the old Nevada State Prison by prisoners. Shinarump sandstone from Southern Utah is colored with iron oxide, forming landscape patterns. It is cut and sold as absorbent drink coasters and decorative objects.
